Otago Peninsula Pump Track Fundraising Goal Reached

CONSTRUCTION TO BEGIN MARCH 2023

For the past four years, members and volunteers of Portobello Community Inc. have worked tirelessly for an all-ages, all-stages Pump Track playspace for the Otago Peninsula community. With the generous support of many funding organisations, private and public donations, and some outstanding community fundraising, the goal of \$275,000 that we needed to build the track has now been reached!

Peninsula community, who supported our various fundraising initiatives over the last four years. These included the community quiz that was held at the Portobello Pub, the comedy night at Coronation Hall, a massive mud race, various raffles at Portobello Market days, auctions and endless sausage sizzles. The people have truly been behind this initiative and it is so exciting that they will soon get to see the rewards.

During 2021-22, Portobello Community Inc. worked to create an agreed MOU with the **Dunedin City Council** to build the track on the grounds of the Portobello Domain on Allans Beach Road. Centrally located in the village with car-parking, toilets and other playspace amenities, the track will help revitalise the Domain and its use for the future.

Our grateful thanks go to stalwart institutional supporters of the Pump Track project, who have contributed in different ways and advocated for our project: the **Otago Peninsula Community Board**, **Te Rūnaka o Ōtākou**,

We also greatly appreciate the major funding contributions from the following organisations, which have ensured the realisation of this community playspace dream: the Alexander Macmillan Fund, The Otago Community Trust, The New Zealand Lotteries Commission, a wide range of public and private donors, and of course the passionate Otago Peninsula community.


Community organiser and Portobello Inc. member Dan Parker has been working with track builders **Empire of Dirt** behind the scenes to ensure that construction will commence on schedule once all the funds are in place. He says, "We're so excited to see this dream turn into a reality for our community! It will be a brilliant playspace for everyone to use."

The build is planned for March 2023 and will take around three weeks to complete.

One more push for funds to enhance the space, including native plantings around the completed pump track, will see Portobello Community Inc. host a giant sausage sizzle/toastie bonanza at the **Ngāi Tahu Treaty Festival at Ōtākou Marae on Monday 6 February** from 10am.

BOOK REVIEW

You have probably come across Bear Grylls on TV. This book by Bear has two stories in it: Facing Up and Facing the Frozen Ocean. Bear spent three years as a soldier in the SAS before breaking his back in three places from a free fall parachuting accident in Africa. After months of rehabilitation he went on to become one of the youngest climbers to summit Everest. I have read many books on Everest, and I really enjoyed Bear's account of the climb.



Facing the Frozen Ocean tells of his adventures with four others in an open IRB in which they crossed the North Atlantic Ocean. They started at Nova Scotia and called into Newfoundland, Greenland, Iceland, the Faroe Islands and ultimately landed at John O'Groats, Scotland. They also stopped at the Westman Islands (Vestmannaeyjar), just south of Iceland. I Googled the Westman Islands and the Faroe Islands, what fascinating places they are.

STOP (Save The Otago Peninsula)

The tree growth has been amazing during the last few months. Do visit the Future Forest Walk starting from the first gate off the Bacon Track (at the end of the no-exit end of Bacon Street, Turnbulls Bay) and see how it has changed since your last visit.

Unfortunately, the grass growth has also been spectacular! Volunteers are now turning their attention to releasing trees planted in previous years to maximise their survival rate. This involves cutting away the grass that is blocking the light to the plant and digging out any grass roots that are competing with the plant for nutrition. Some volunteers are also cutting and pasting patches of currently flowering gorse that threaten to overtake plantings.

Regular working bees with any necessary tools provided, meet at the end of Bacon St in Turnbulls Bay (the next bay past Broad Bay) every Tuesday and Sunday at 9.30am.

If you have a special birthday or anniversary coming up this year and would like to donate some trees to commemorate

Invasive Weeds Update from SWAT

the year again. Keep an eye out this festive season and into February for the distinctive brilliant red flowers and shamrock-looking leaves of the Chilean Flame Creeper (CFC). You might see it flowering on road verges or at the edges of bush blocks while you're out walking the dog. It's an invasive climbing perennial fine stemmed vine which climbs into the canopy of our native bush where it blocks light and smothers and kills trees. The vine develops a thick

rhizome root mass which can extend for 10m. It is very hardy and extremely difficult to kill once it is established. SWAT has found that new vine infestations are more easily eradicated than established vines so early detection is vital





and now is the best time to detect it as the thin stems die back in winter making it harder to spot. We are lucky it is not widespread on the Peninsula yet with Pukehiki being the main infestation area, however there are several locations in Broad Bay and Portobello where it has recently been found, presumably spread by birds. Good surveillance is key to spotting a new pest plant before it has a chance to spread, so if you spot some CFC, please email us with the location.

Quarantine Island/Kamau Taurua Community Inc.

Kia ora koutou,

It has been a busy couple of months on the motu with many day visitors and family groups choosing to stay overnight in

the Lodge on weekends and in school holidays enjoy some 'island time' or celebrate a birthday. The island's native plants and trees, grasses and weeds, have been thriving and the bush, shore and seabirds have been busy caring for nestlings and fledglings.

A number of local and regional schools held camps on the island or used the Lodge as a base for the Marine Studies Centre programme. Local band Soaked Oats held a recording/writing residency, a nonviolent communication retreat for mothers was held,

the W.E.E. (Women's Empowerment Experience) Treat women's retreat returned, and we hosted former Syrian refugee women and their children for a few nights 'island' holiday.

Day visitors have included teams from Fisher & Paykel, Otago Regional Council, Kāinga Ora, New Zealand

Ecological Society and a group of post-grad students from the School of Medicine and School of Pharmacy, University of Otago held a writers retreat. QuakeCoRE **Emerging Researchers** Chapter (QERC), students interested in earthquake resilience (predominantly from Geography, Geology and the Centre for Sustainability) also held a postgraduate student writing retreat. Taskforce Green spent a day taming grass around the buildings and paths leading up to the Reserve, and at the causeway.

We've held a number of mahi volunteer days and our Welcome Day's have all been enjoyed by new visitors and regulars/Community members getting stuck into caring for seedlings and weed control, improvements to the Keepers Cottage, sorting the wool and tool shed, and replacing the jetty timber decking.

Broad Bay resident, Petra Hass, who kayaks over to spend time on the island, and to visit the Knudson Chapel, chose the motu for her summer school assignment and joined a small group of Community members and volunteers at one of the December mahi days. "I enjoyed the day on the island blessed by gorgeous weather. I also enjoyed being able to make a small contribution to the upkeep of this very special place...Thank you so much for making it so easy for me to join in as a volunteer despite my obvious lack of

experience. I did learn a lot!..Such a magical place, a true source of spiritual calm and nurture."

Thanks to all our volunteers and Community members for their efforts on and off the island over the last few months. Mahi has included caring for new seedlings planted by the Aurora Energy team and individuals and groups from the wider community in September, releasing and watering, weed control, monitoring predator

traps and tracking tunnels, helping with the final Spring bird count, and leading groups, the Keeper's Cottage improvements and replacing jetty decking timber.

We are grateful to Otago Peninsula Community Board for funding towards jetty decking timber, Otago Regional Council ECO Fund, and Rotary Club of Dunedin South for

funds to help us to continue our regeneration project involving the wider community, Paul Clements for all his mahi on the Cottage upgrades, and general maintenance, and Port-To-Port Cruises and Wildlife Tours, and East Coast Charters who have provided boat transfers. Thanks also to Bill Boes for shearing the sheep flock.

Fruit trees and possums! ... and dog detection

It is that time of year when possums will start to look for

fruit. They love the sweetness of a ripe plum, apple or pear and they will seek these out once they are ripe. For the Peninsula residents that live between Portobello and Harington Point your fruit will be safe, as well as your roses. We are becoming more and more

confident that we are down to an extremely low number of possums. We have had a specialist dog detector and trainer



out in the rural areas this week and they have found only two spots so far and are covering quite a big area. They are working with their dogs for the next three weeks to mop up the last possums in the Portobello to Headland and around Papanui Inlet, Cape Saunders.



There have been two possums detected and one of them caught in the Portobello township over the last 6 months. We are tracking well but need to be vigilant with trapping as they can move into the village from further down the Peninsula, especially if you

have fruit trees. So please set your traps, get in touch if you need any lure for your traps and let us know if you see or hear a possum.






