CHAIR'S MESSAGE

Kia orana,

With the arrival of April, we are seeing the weather suddenly cool down - some days more than others. It was good to see our new roads were resilient to the recent rain and gale force winds. It was also a timely reminder to make sure we're prepared for severe weather events, especially after seeing the ongoing impact of flooding in Northland since December. The best way to ensure our communities are resilient in emergency situations is by making sure our individual households are prepared. The mornings and evenings are a little darker as we move deeper into autumn towards winter. There has been that slightly cooler feel to the mornings

after a long and glorious summer.

CIVIC AFFAIRS COMMITTEE **PRESENTATION**

With the election of a new Mayor and Council the structure of some Council committees has been changed. A new committee for Board's to present their community's views has recently been created, and all members of the Peninsula Board attended. Our presentation concentrated some of the "nuts and bolts" issues facing our area such as:

- · Getting things finished like the Otakou section of the Connection **Project**
- The lack of footpaths, decent drainage and repairs to sea walls
- · Our tracks and public areas
- The time delays in getting simple things done like the Wellers Rock signage and parking.

SCHOOL SPEED LIMITS

The City Council has proposed that school areas at Portobello, Broad Bay and Macandrew Bay have speed limits of 30 kmph. There were two options in the consultation process which included:


- · Having the limits on permanently
- · Having the limits during peak school times

The Board chose to submit that the limits should be during peak school operating times. It also and raised with Council:

While speed limits may prove somewhat effective, many of

our schools have no footpaths or safe crossing points to get children to school in the first place.

All townships need the digital speed signs to remind motorists of their speed.

Tēnā koutou everyone

We are well into the first term of school, and I have been monitoring our schools at drop off and pick up times. A big thanks to the majority of you parents. I like what I have seen in relation to taking care, not parking in compromised positions and the general safety of our tamariki. Good job, keep it up.

Remember to use booster seats or capsules for your really little ones. These need to be fitted properly to have

maximum effect should they be required to do their job properly.

Some issues on the school bus over the past few weeks. I am getting reports of older kids vaping, bullying, and generally playing up. If

your child takes the bus, please remind them that this is a

privilege and a great asset to have to get to and from school. It certainly takes a lot of pressure off us parents in the mornings. Any nonsense will not be tolerated and will be dealt with accordingly in conjunction with the service provider and police (if it warrants our intervention). This may mean taking away the privilege of using this service if it is warranted. If you have reports or concerns around some of these behaviours I would like to know please.

With Autumn upon us I'm sure many of you are looking at getting prepared for winter. This will mean delivery of firewood for the upcoming winter. Once again, I remind people to put your firewood away quickly if it's dropped at your gate or on your driveway. This commodity which is not cheap like anything today is easy pickings for those who wish for you to pay for their warmth. Try and stack away out of sight from the road to avoid giving those who think it's ok to steal the opportunity to do so.

If any of our more mature community members find it difficult to or are unable to put it where it needs to go, shout out and I am sure, along with myself, we can get a small crew together to come and get it done for you. Please reach out if you need assistance.

In case you drive with your eyes closed (not recommended) you will have noticed a large round-a-bout has been built in

the Portobello village. This is nothing to be scared of. There are certain rules around your approach and exit of these round things. It is not difficult and if you can't remember or are confused, please feel free to go onto the LTNZ website and refresh your memory about your obligations as a driver when entering and exiting such round things. If this is still too complicated, come up to the station and I can talk you through it and even print you off a flier. Safety is paramount here and I am going to be monitoring it periodically.

Speed and impatient drivers continue to come to my attention. 

The Just Swim lessons are now complete. The students gain a lot from these experts coming to our pool. Teachers also gain lots of tips on how to improve swimming technique. The cost of these lessons is covered by the Ministry of Education School Donations Scheme.

CEMETERY ROAD

This small project is still ongoing. There seems to be continuous discoveries of soft patches beneath the surface which then need to be removed before a fresh layer of gravel can be laid and compacted. The end date is continuously moving but we are hopeful for completion by

late March. Even though it is a small piece of roading, it is a really important one as it means staff can park beside the pool therefore freeing up space in the bottom carpark for whānau to drop off and pick up their

tamariki.

Playground installation

The contractors are making progress with this piece of playground equipment. The earthworks on the site are now complete and we await concreting of the main pole. Once this is complete, then the horizontal part is put on, then the finishing touches of wooden edging and bark chips. After that, it's all go! We are all looking forward to its completion.

LED LIGHTING AND ACOUSTIC PANEL INSTALLATION

We recently had all of our lighting upgraded to LED lights. This was done over the period of a week. At the same time Room 5, Room 4, Room 3, Junior Whānau and the elearning hub had acoustic panels installed. This has made a big difference to the atmosphere and sound in our classes. Thank you to Aotea and Southern Collective for their flexible attitude while these installs were taking place.


Portobello Volunteer Fire Brigade

FIRE SEASON

The recent dry weather has increased the risk of fires getting out of control and this is the reason why Fire and Emergency had a total fire ban in place. With the recent small amount of

rain, some risk has been mitigated but we still need to be vigilant. Please call 111 if you see any signs of fire.

The Otago Peninsula is now in a Restricted fire season, which means a permit is required before lighting any outdoor fires.



WAITANGI CELEBRATIONS

Our brigade was privileged to be invited to the celebrations at Ōtākou Marae. We had the Escape Challenge Maze set up for the kids and also a smoke alarm display. Several people signed up for a free Home Fire Safety visit and we will be out in our community completing these shortly.

If you would like a home fire safety visit, feel free to call either myself, Jamie 027 481-3075 or any member of the brigade.

DAYLIGHT SAVINGS

Daylight saving ends on Sunday 2nd of April. This is a good time to check your smoke alarms and replace batteries if required.

All domestic smoke alarms have a 10 year life and it's a good idea to check the manufacturer's date while testing them. Fire and Emergency recommend Long Life Photoelectric smoke alarms are installed.

EMERGENCY ACCESS

In the past we have been unable to access properties due to overgrown vegetation on driveways.

We recommend that a path 4 metres wide by 4 metres high is maintained to allow us access for emergency vehicles.

Any delay in arriving at an emergency can be serious. If you are unsure about access to your property feel free to make contact.

OUIZ NIGHT.

After a couple of years break, the brigade is going to be running our annual quiz in the Coronation Hall, Portobello. The date hasn't been finalised yet but we're looking at the end of September.

We have had several visitors visit the Museum who are wanting information on old Portobello families. Luckily for


> them we were able to help in a small way.

- 1. Captain Henry Stratford Ridley (Master Mariner), wife Violetta and son Henry Stratford Junior (aged 3) arrived in Dunedin
- on the Victory in 1848. In 1868 Captain Ridley and his 11 year old son Charles were drowned when their boat collided with another boat in the harbour during a severe squall. They are buried in the Old Port Chalmers Cemetery.
- 2. Captain William Leslie (Master Mariner) and his family arrived in Portobello with his family in 1861. Both William Senior and William Junior had their homes on Harbour Cone. William Senior died in 1894 and is buried alongside his wife Emma in the Portobello Cemetery. William Junior and his wife Mary had a family of 9 children. In 1908 they purchased a farm at Ahuriri Flat in the Owaka district.

HEAVY RAINS

FLOODS IN TOWN AND COUNTRY

Several City Streets Still Under Water

Otago Daily Times, 24 April 1923 (via Papers Past)

The Lower road to Portobello has suffered severely, and the cost of repairing the damage will be very heavy. Between Dunedin and Macandrew's Bay probably more than a dozen landslides have taken place as a result of the water pouring down the hill-In most cases the clay has been washed down to a sufficient extent to cover the whole width of the road, but in some instances trees have also been dislodged and have fallen across the track, making a fair-way absolutely impossible. Some falls have occurred between Macandrew's Portobello, beyond which further damage has been caused. Within some two miles of Portobello on the read to Otakou the road has been blocked in four places by land sliding, the debris in one case including a large kaio tree, which covers the whole width of the road.

Fresh art coming to Broad Bay bus shelters

Two new bus shelters in Broad Bay are about to get a fresh look.

Experienced local artists will soon paint colourful murals on the shelters as part of the Peninsula Connection project. Each shelter will feature the Te Reo Māori name for the area, Whaka Oho Rahi, along with the street name.

Thomas Hancock has painted the shelter at the corner of Matariki Street in a fresh, contemporary design that sets outlines of native fauna against local colours to evoke a feeling of harmony between land and sea.

The shelter at King George Street will be painted by Aaven Junior, whose bold, energetic work celebrates the lively spirit of Whaka Oho Rahi, with elements such as a teapot, gumboot and umbrella hidden in the design. In acknowledgement of Te Rūnanga o Ōtākou as mana whenua, Aaven's design will use "Ōtākou Red" as the key colour – this was also used on Ayesha Green's Octagon sculpture Kō te Tūhono.

Otago Peninsula Community Board Chair Paul Pope says, "The Peninsula Connection project has brought new opportunities to celebrate cultural and artistic aspects of our community that enrich the Peninsula and its stories."

"The new bus shelters are a welcome addition to the community, and to have new young artists involved is particularly exciting. The public painting of bus shelters has been a part of the Otago Peninsula since the first were painted by the late John Noakes. It's become a signature part of our landscape for locals and visitors alike."

The murals were selected by a panel with representatives from the Otago Peninsula Community Board and Te Rūnanga o Ōtākou in an open process.

The shelters will be closed when the artists are working on them, but the bus stops will continue to be used for picking up and dropping off passengers. Work on the Broad Bay section of the Peninsula Connection is progressing well and is on track to finish around the middle of the year. Work in the Portobello township should be complete in April.





STOP (Save The Otago Peninsula)

It is exciting to see trees planted in previous years now producing seed. Do take a walk around the Future Forest to admire the growth. The trees have enjoyed the recent rain.

Volunteers are now turning their attention to releasing trees planted in previous years to maximise their survival rate. This involves cutting away the grass that is blocking the light to the plant and digging out any grass roots that are competing with the plant for nutrition. Some volunteers are also cutting and pasting patches of currently flowering gorse that threaten to overtake plantings.

We have regular working bees with any necessary tools provided - meet at the end of Bacon St in Turnbulls Bay (the next bay past Broad Bay) every Tuesday and Sunday at 9.30am.

Invasive Weeds Update from SWAT

As we approach autumn after our long warm dry summer, any Chilean Flame Creeper (CFC) that flowered this season is now covered in rapidly ripening dark purple

berries ready for the birds to gobble up and spread. We focussed on this weed over summer around the Pukehiki area and we hope to have prevented any seeds forming this year. Fortunately, CFC does not seem to be present yet in Portobello, but it has popped up just down the road in a couple of places in Bro

down the road in a couple of places in Broad Bay. Good surveillance is key to spotting a new pest plant before it has a chance to spread. So if you spot some CFC while out and about, please email us at SWATweeds@gmail.com

We have just undertaken our annual visit to Goat Island / Rakiriri. This 4.5 hectare island is just across the main shipping channel from Quarantine Island / Kamau Taurua and is designated as a scenic reserve and historic area. Over the years,

considerable effort has been put into getting pest plants like Banana Passionfruit and Bomarea under control. This island is an important stepping stone for birds traversing

> the harbour so it is important to keep the native trees there from being strangled by invasive vines. It was fantastic to see the hard work paying off with the predominant vines now being native clematis and parsonsia

happily co-exiting with the forest, instead of the rampant invaders. Only one fruiting vine was found and most of our time was spent removing small seedlings to prevent reinfestation.

It has been a busy couple of months on the motu with many day visitors and groups choosing to stay overnight in the

Lodge enjoying some 'island time'. We have welcomed the recent rain after the extended dry spell, especially for the island's native seedlings and our water tanks. The bush, shore and seabirds have continued to be busy caring for nestlings and fledglings.

Two weddings were held in the Married Quarters building, and a wellness retreat used the building during their stay, and a couple of homeschool families held camps. Taieri College held a student residential

course for Year 13 prefects,
Salmond College held a student
Residential Leaders camp,
Bayfield School held a weeklong camp, and Ahikā
Consulting held their annual
hui. Day visitors included
Trinity Catholic College Year 11
History students, Elmgrove
School Year 5 students, and a
large group of staff members
from Findex spent a day
volunteering helping with weed
control, releasing seedlings and
grubbing thistles.

We've held a number of mahi volunteer days and our Welcome Day's have all been enjoyed by new visitors and regular volunteers/Community members. Mahi has included caring for seedlings, releasing and watering, weed control, monitoring predator traps and tracking tunnels, and leading groups, improvements to the Keeper's Cottage, moving, splitting and storing firewood, and replacing the jetty timber

decking. Thanks to all our volunteers and Community members for their efforts on and off the island over the last few months.

On our Welcome Day on the 25th of February, a special event took place to celebrate the unveiling of a new Chapel plaque commissioned by the Chapel's architect, Bob Oakley. Members of his whānau and former members of St. Martin Island Community (SMIC) attended including Charles Clark, Peter Matheson and our oldest Community member, Lyndall Hancock. Protection for Rutherford's Bush

Thanks to generous contributors, more native bush on the Hereweka Harbour Cone block is now protected. In January this year 5.7 hectares of forest on a steep slope and the adjacent shrubland were enclosed by a one kilometer fence.

The forest, informally known as Rutherford's Bush, is one of the few remaining old forests on the Otago Peninsula and has a high diversity of native plants.

31 tree and shrub species, 22 ferns and 11 climbers represent a significant seed source. In the absence of grazing by farm stock, young plants will thrive and natural regeneration will ensure the survival and long term health of the bush.

In time, the plant communities will expand to fill the available space within the fenced area, increasing valuable habitat for native birds and invertebrates.

Rutherford's Bush is adjacent to a neighbouring forest protected by a QEII covenant and within a short distance of forests on Peggy's Hill and Stewarts Creek that were fenced in 2009 and 2010. The proximity of Rutherford's Bush to three other protected forest areas greatly increases its value as part of a network of indigenous biodiversity in a mainly pastoral landscape.

Rutherford's Bush can be seen from the walking track (previously a road or driveway) to the original Rutherford's farmstead.

From Highcliff Road, starting at the double gates on either side of the road, it's a short walk following the yellow marker posts. You are welcome to explore the native bush. There is a stile for access where the fence drops down into the gully.

PENINSULA POSSUMS

Whilst all exercises were good for the heart, golf seemed to be the best, despite being a lower- intensity exercise.

That may be because the duration of a golf game is longer and requires more energy overall.

There you are, you can tell your family that you were not goofing off at golf, it really was doing you good. So, with that information we hope to see you on the course more often. And bring a friend.



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
